# Rare Moth Find

As a moth trapper and recorder I was interested to see a moth I did not recognise escape from the short mat bowling carpet as it was unrolled when playing bowls on Monday (28th July). I managed to catch it and took it home in a pot at the end of the night.

With the help of several books and my partner Keith, who also has the same hobby, we eventually managed to identify it.



This is apparently a Large Tabby (Aglossa pinguinalis) which has only been recorded twice before in this North East Yorkshire recording area - once in 1883 and once in 1964 so a very interesting find. See attached photo. It was later released unharmed.

TOYS - dolls, toy trucks, stuffed animals (must have CE label), harmonicas, yo-yos, skipping ropes, balls, small puzzles.

# Parish Council News

Members of the Parish Council recently met with Kevin Baker, design consultant, and Caroline Patmore, our District/County Councillor to discuss the recent consultation on a residential development south of Prospect Cottages.

We can confirm that Mr Baker is acting on behalf of the land owner by distributing the Community Consultation in an effort to ascertain public opinion on the proposed development. He is not the actual developer, his role is simply to consult on the proposal to build 20 houses on the site and assess its suitability in terms of access, geology and ecology. The details on his flyer of the site layout and housing mix etc. were merely there in order to prompt people to give these matters some thought.

Mr Baker assured the Parish Council that all comments received from parishioners would be taken into consideration before the scheme progresses to the next stage. Therefore, at present, there is nothing further to report.

We had a fantastic response to our own plea for your reactions to the proposal and therefore are confident that we can accurately reflect the views of the village in future discussions. We are in ongoing communication with the Planning department and the landowner's representative and, rest assured, when we receive any new details regarding the proposed development we will inform you immediately.



#### Who do you think they were?

I have spent the last few months gathering information on some of the 121 men commemorated on the Husthwaite War Memorial and Roll of Honour in Husthwaite church, who enlisted in the Armed Forces to serve in the 1914-1918 War.

Unfortunately, there are many unanswered questions and many young men that I have been unable to track down – for example:

Was P Ghyll actually P Guyll who lived in Carlton Husthwaite in1911 and left two little sons behind when he went off to war?

Who were F Beech and W Beech? Were they brothers or maybe father and son?

However there are one or two fascinating stories including:

- A soldier returning with a 'Disordered Action of the Heart' who received the Silver War Badge. The medal was not only an honour, but had a practical purpose to ensure that the soldiers discharged through wounds or illness were not presented with a white feather, a symbol of cowardice often handed out by women. Sadly, his son was killed in the war;
- A young woman from Carlton Husthwaite working in a munitions factory in Leeds where many of the women turned yellow because of the chemicals they were dealing with and were known as 'canaries';
- The Ladies War Working Group, which raised money by organising a Whist Drive in the School Rooms, followed by dancing, which lasted until 3 am!
- The boy who spent over 5 years at an industrial school (Industrial schools were meant to solve the problems of juvenile delinquency by removing poor and neglected children from their home environment to a boarding school), who went on to be awarded the Distinguished Conduct Medal.

I now have the task of writing this up for publication by the History Society.

#### <u>A busy start .....</u>

We welcomed children safely back into school for the start of the autumn term. It has been fantastic to be back at school with the warm weather allowing children to once again enjoy our wonderful grounds during playtimes before the damp weather sets in and the grass becomes too wet for children to play on.

We welcomed some new staff into school this term alongside our new pupils. Mrs Warriner will be job sharing with Mrs Fowler up until the October half term and Mr Sims will be teaching Year 4 each morning. A new appointment has also been made in the office and we welcome Miss Mellers who will assist Mrs Dixon. As some of you will have heard, Mrs Bainbridge has taken on a joint headship

role with Sessay School after being approached by them to initiate new working practices which are a way forward in ensuring village schools remain at the heart of rural communities.

The whole school topic this term is 'castles' which has included learning what a castle actually is, model making, fairy tales, discovering the life of a knight and story writing. Class 3GG have also been focussing literacy work on WW1. Visits to Clifford's Tower, York and Helmsley Castle and the bird of prey centre will take place as part of this topic work.



In line with our 'Experience Easter' and 'Experience Christmas' whole school activities at the Church, we shall this term be 'Experiencing Harvest' – a wonderful opportunity for children to fully understand the value of 'harvest'.

Later in the term we shall also hold a Remembrance Day service at St Nicholas Church at 10.30am -

members of the community are welcome to attend. The whole school will also participate in an activity day focussed on WW1. Numeracy work so far has included mental addition practice, place value and column addition.

Y6 children have participated in bikeability; a cycling proficiency course for children to enhance their awareness of bike and road skills.

A polling day was held for pupils to vote for their School Council



with potential candidates canvassing for votes and outlining their own manifesto!

A new incentive for older pupils at school this year is the opportunity to be a member of 'sports crew' – a group of pupils who will organise various sporting events for all children in the school participate in.

Children will also represent the school this term in football, netball and cross country







participating in matches with other schools in both the local cluster and across North Yorkshire.

#### Husthwaite Nursery – Rising 3s

We were delighted to welcome 5 new children into our nursery this term. We are also delighted to announce that we can now accept children into nursery earlier than in the past, admitting children at the start of the term they turn 3 – please enquire at the school office for further details. Applications for the nursery can be made via the school website. We are continuing to hold our monthly toddler drop-in sessions. These are free sessions accessible by all pre-school age children – birth upwards – and their parents. The next date is Friday 10 October – full dates available on the school website.

#### School Open Afternoon

On Wednesday 19<sup>th</sup> November the school is inviting all present and prospective parents (and children) to an open afternoon from 1.30-5.00pm. Teachers and staff are welcoming members of the local and wider community to come along and see the school in action. There will be various activities on offer showcasing children's learning through traditional methods and new technologies, art displays, music and fun events. A children's judo club will also be in action after school. Refreshments will be served to visitors from 3.30pm and the school will remain open until 5pm to give people the opportunity to view children's work on display and talk to the staff.

#### CONSERVATION AREA

It has been suggested that the PC look into strengthening the village Conservation Area.

In short it would mean that planning would need to be sought for things such as changes to the exterior appearance of a property, demolition of walls and fences, and the installation of solar panels.

We have a spare defibrillator and this in addition to the First Responder Scheme could be installed somewhere in the village (Village Hall, Campsite) so that the general public are able to access it should a First Responder not be available. The cost of installation is quite high but the PC is looking into ways to fund the cost of £745 plus VAT.

DRAINS

Some drains remain blocked, namely Prospect Cottages & Elphin View.

#### STREET SIGNS

Hambleton are going to assess the street name signs and (hopefully) replace/repair as necessary.

#### VOLLEYBALL

Volleyball equipment will be installed at the Recreation Ground imminently.

#### RUBBISH AT THE MUGA

Carol Fenwick has been regularly checking rubbish at the MUGA and has not noticed any discarded rubbish but if anyone does notice rubbish please tell one of your PC'ers.

#### PARISH PLAN

The PC are going to give an update on the Parish<sup>20</sup> Plan Action Plan.

#### VILLAGE SEATS

The PC has commissioned John Howland from Coxwold to refurbish and repaint all village seats.

#### STREET LIGHTING

We have had word from Hambleton that there is no intention of replacing the street lights with LED bulbs.

#### WATER LEAK ON KAYS BANK

The leak on Kays Bank has been investigated by Yorkshire Water and they say no chlorine is present but there are high levels of nitrates which points towards a possible spring mixing with animals waste, such as cattle; no one knows but the PC are as a matter of urgency chasing Highways .Caroline Patmore is also on the case.

#### LOW STREET RESURFACING

The PC has questioned Highways as to why Low Street has been resurfaced....no one knows! Highways had it on their 'to do list' so it has been done! That was their answer.

#### FOOTPATHS

The Low Street footway has been put forward on a list for Thirsk Area to be assessed for funding by the central team so fingers crossed.

There is next to no chance that we will get a footpath on the Nookin towards the Village Hall.

#### EAST VIEW TREES

The PC has written to Broadacres regarding the possible trimming of the trees on East View green, and are awaiting a response.

#### HOUSING DEVELOPMENT.

Caroline Patmore has spoken to Mark Harbottle (Planning Chief at Hambleton!) and has expressed her dissatisfaction with Kevin Baker setting a rat running by approaching the village directly (flyers through letterboxes) about the proposed new development rather than approaching the Parish Council first. In future the PC will initially receive any correspondence and information, and the PC will then digest this information before passing on to the rest of the village.

Kevin Baker has confirmed his intention to submit an outline planning application for twenty dwellings but there will be no detailed layout or design specifications. The PC has passed all information/concerns gathered from the village last month to Kevin Baker and a Public Meeting will be called to determine the opinion of the village before the Parish Council responds to any planning application. Caroline Patmore also suggested to Mark Harbottle that alternative access should be looked at.

#### CAROLINE PATMORE

Caroline reports that crime as a whole has fallen dramatically in our region; however shoplifting has risen.

## You Saw the Play. Don't Miss the Movie

**Drovers' Road - the movie** comes to the Village Hall on Sunday 16th November at 4.30. Those of you who have seen a Mike and Breda Wells Byland Media production of a Husthwaite pantomime or play will be ready for an experience every bit as good as going to the cinema.. Ticket prices will be £3.00, and DVDs will be available if pre- ordered, at £5.00.

In the spirit of community, the play opens in the village street. The audience meet the cast under the lime tree on the village green and join them as they sing and dance up the "drovers' road" to the Village Hall.

Four teenager hikers get lost in a typical Yorkshire fog and spend the night on the moor. Into their dreams come the ghosts of the thousands of people who have trekked that road over the centuries. We meet the staff of the Limekiln Inn on Kepwick Moor. The pub's girls are impatient to eye up the talent, the droving boys so thrillingly different from their own boring moorland farm boyfriends.

We see a vivid scene with special appeal for farming folk, when a drover bargains with his mate for the sale of part of the herd.

Watch out, too, for the grim moment when King Edward II and his freezing, starving supporters meet the Little Thieves, a gaggle of local lasses up to no good. What is a king of 700 years ago to make of a 21<sup>st</sup> century teenager who despises him for "noshing" at Rievaulx Abbey when his men are dying of starvation?

Husthwaite's audiences are familiar with some of the actors: David Pike as the King, Catherine Skinner as Grandma, Anne Dowsoff as the landlady of the Limekiln Inn, Stephen

Barker as the menacing wolf. Zoe Lodge is the flighty spirit of the moorland weather, and

Jane Cluley's road flows serenely through the centuries to become a traffic-torn motorway.

The village's new generation of performers introduce themselves: Rebecca Colton as Laura, a convincingly stressed leader of the teenagers; Katie Pickstone as a naughty little thief; Alex Colton and James Sibley play the cattle selling scene beautifully; Hannah Benn is one of the pub girls desperate to be remembered by the last drover who fancied her; and Rory Watt, lively, and energetic as the youngest of the hikers, threatens to poke the audience with his stick.

Young people from Easingwold and the surrounding villages help give the play its vital enthusiasm: highly talented Maja Szyszka as Margaret the bullied unmarried mother; dynamic Kieren Hardy as a ghastly soul of the moor.

Small children, pre-school and Husthwaite Primary School age, are rounded up from the audience to play the cattle. Much loved local dogs, Drover and Gracie, are the drovers' dogs, including the historically accurate moment when, after their droving work is done, they are ordered to find their own way back home to Scotland.

The play's song and dance have flute accompaniment by the wandering minstrel, Gila Robinson.

Mike Wells and John Ovenston, each with a young apprentice technician, use magnificent sound and lighting to enhance the darkly atmospheric quality of the moor. Hidden behind the curtain Rob Colton gives the play its pacey continuity.
