Parked Cars Block Footpaths

The Parish Council has received a number of complaints about the regular obstruction of footpaths in the village. The principal causes are parked vehicles and overgrown hedges.

The incidence of cars parked on the footpath is increasing. Such inconsiderate parking causes pedestrians, particularly wheelchair/ mobility scooter users and those with a pram, to walk on the road to get by. This is a danger to themselves and to motorists. It would be much appreciated if those responsible would park considerately on the road. If the problem persists then individuals will be approached and if this fails the police will become involved.

If your hedge is not cut back far enough and to a height of 6ft or more it can cause a similar problem. Please consider others who are, perhaps, less mobile than yourself and make sure that you leave the footpath wide enough for access. None of us wish to see an injury or fatality as a result of a lack of consideration for others.

dog fouling

The Parish Council is again receiving complaints about dog fouling on the footpaths around the area. Indeed, far from diminishing, it seems to be on the increase.

May we remind you that the Dog Fouling Regulations apply not only to the pavements in the village but to ALL public footpaths. That includes the path that runs at the side of the beck from the recycling centre to Highthorne Lane. The problem has been brought to the attention of the Dog Warden and he will be visiting the area at intervals to ensure compliance. If caught you will face prosecution.

Please, help to keep our village a pleasant place, and clean it up!

Parish Planners Focus on Recreation Field

It has been a busy last few months for the Parish Council with our focus on delivering the actions from the Parish Plan. It is vital that not only the community but also District and County Council as well as other relevant bodies and agencies are aware and see that the Parish Plan is being implemented and not just left on the shelf.

The implementation process will inevitably assist with future funding for projects which in turn will result in greater and more varied amenities being made available to the village and its community. Regular updates are now being forwarded on progress by the Parish Council to the *Newsletter* with this edition seeing the Implementation Up-Date 2 being published (centre pages). One of the major projects for the Parish Council is that of the Recreational Field Facility. Alun Nixon and I have taken on this challenge and an update can be found in the Implementation Up-Date 2. We are only too aware of the water that has passed under this particular bridge and are preparing the basis for options papers to be produced.

moving quickly

This has meant direct meetings with various District Councillors and departments to establish what they feel would be achievable, deliverable, maintainable and fit for purpose now and in to the future. The meetings with councillors have so far been positive and progressive and we are moving as quickly as possible on this project as we all agree that the lack of these types of facilities within our village is an area which must be addressed sooner rather than later. It is hoped that we will be able to update the community with some good news in the near future, as although the project will undoubtedly be a long one, a phased implementation of it should ensure that some facilities become available within a reasonable time scale and start to form the basis of what should be a great facility for all the people of Husthwaite for many years to come.

A joint meeting was held in September with the Village Hall Committee. The meeting was to discuss how the Village Hall could best service the Parish Plan, not only now but also in the years to come. As I'm sure you will all be aware, the Village Hall Committee have been working hard on your behalf to secure funding in order to carry out some of the items raised in the Parish Plan and indeed have been successful in raising a considerable sum to date.

To That Other Husthwaite

another in our series of walks and bike rides starting and finishing in the village

There's great variety and historic interest in this two hours or so gentle ramble that inspires you to find out more about what you never really see from the car.

From the Parish Church, cross the road and take the signed public footpath through gardens to a well-used streamside path, where you turn right and go down the fields. Bordering is the mostly intact centuries-old hedge complete with wild plum, damson and hops. Soon you reach the recycling bins and the road, which you cross to follow the unmade, poplar-lined way to ancient Baxby Manor, going round to the left and then to the right down to the bridge over Elphin Beck, continuing along Ings Lane (signed) past the old railway and Baxby Aero Club. The lane then veers to the right and continues through fields and New Manor Farm.

fine buildings

As you reach Carlton Husthwaite, take a left by a curved, corrugated iron building and the workshops of Chris Topp, ironmaker, and go along a back lane for a new angle on some of the village's fine old buildings. On the left are still the ridge and furrow fields of bygone farming days. You will reach the road, where you turn right. Keep straight on past (or via) the Carlton Inn, the village green and the tiny, golden stone church and out of the village. At the first bend, a delightful bridleway (signed) goes straight on and up to a gate. Continue with the hedge to your left, through another gate and to the left of the buildings behind Angram Grange, once a farm of Byland Abbey. You will reach the farm track, but this short stretch of bridleway was a bit overgrown with some minor obstructions when checked for this walk, although all may be well by the time this is published. When you turn right at the farm track and go through a farm gate with yellow footpath and blue bridleway arrows on it you will realise you're in a different part of the same field you previously crossed. Follow the bridleway diagonally and down to re-join the road near the driveway to Angram Hall. After you pass the former Husthwaite Gate station house and its windmill and a path to the right, cross Elphin Bridge and take the next path on the right, which goes up the side of the field and back to the church.



Planners at Work

A reply to our letter has been received from Stephen Pimperton, Highways Maintenance Manager. In response to this letter it was arranged that Robin Houlston and I would attend a site meeting with him. This was a productive meeting at which Mr Pimperton explained how priorities are determined for road maintenance, snow clearing and gritting - enormous challenges in such a huge area as North Yorkshire. He was able to confirm that damaged kerb-stones between the village green and the shop will be replaced in October. He also offered to supply grit bins, if requested by the Parish Council, to be located where difficulties are most likely to be encountered in winter. He was able to confirm that the present practice of reporting concerns via Robin Houlston match their working arrangements, especially since Highways Section relies on parish councils to be their eyes and ears. It was clear from discussion that Mr Pimperton is keen to work in partnership and ensure maintenance work of a high quality.

P
assing Places

In reply to our recent letter, David Chase, Highways Project Manager, has indicated that although this provision is beyond the basic maintenance budget, he is prepared to submit suggestions to NYCC Minor Capital Budget with a view to securing funding for such a project. There will now be liaison with Angram and Carlton Hushwaite regarding passing places on the Carlton road, and Robin Houlston and Carol Fenwick will identify the most suitable places on Malton Street.

Recreation Field

As a pre-requisite to any detailed planning, it is necessary to clarify the leasing terms with HDC. Recent enquiries suggest that in order to access some areas of funding, it will be necessary to establish separate committees, other than the Parish Council. There is to be further correspondence with Highways Section to clarify some matters concerning vehicular access to this area.

A reply to our letter has been received from Graham Hinds, Highways Traffic Management and Development Engineer. Whilst he sympathises with the parking problems around the school, it is not possible to support proposals for a car park for the school in the recreation area, as this would not accord with NYCC transport priorities.

Village Design Statement and Conservation of Rural Setting

In reply to our recent letter, Glen Robinson, Planning Officer at HDC, offered encouragement but explained that help and funding are not available at this time for development of a Village Design Statement (VDS). As there is a natural overlap between VDS and Conservation of Rural Setting (CRS), it was agreed to merge these two priorities. An appeal for two or three volunteers to work with Elaine Smith and Philip Lawson appears elsewhere in this edition of the *Newsletter*. I will explore a possible source of funding from Community Champions.

Village Hall

A meeting to explore future developments was held on 5th September.

Information Pack

Juliet McDougall and Linda Davison outlined suggested contents for the Welcome to Hushwaite pack. The information will be produced on loose-leaf A5 sheets which will be presented in a folder. Such details will be included on the village website (www.hushwaitevillage.co.uk). Total costs are likely to be in excess of 500 and I will explore a possible source of funding through Community Champions.

Next Meeting

The next special meeting of the Parish Council to progress implementation of
